Supervisor's Message: County Deals with Tough Times

Like all California counties,
Tulare County is experiencing
extremely challenging
budget issues. The Board
continues to work to balance
staffing needs with the
available revenues. The
County's Health and Human
Services Agency is
particularly hard hit by large
reductions in funding from
state and federal agencies,
which are the primary
funding sources for our local
agency.

Last year, Tulare County's total budget was \$884 million. Out of that total, \$744.7 (84%) is dedicated to state, federal and other programs which the County administers and only \$139.3 million (15%) is general fund, dollars that the Board of

Supervisors has discretion in spending. Moreover, the state recently eliminated \$3.1 million in Williamson Act subvention payments to the County, which funds are general fund monies.

For every dollar paid in property taxes, on average, only 16 cents goes to the County's treasury. Even so, these taxes are a major portion of the general fund. The recent burst in the real estate market has resulted in a reduction in the assessed values of hundreds of homes and farms in Tulare County and shows no sign of abating. Reduced assessments mean less property tax, which when coupled with reduced state and federal program dollars produces a devastating impact on the total revenues to the county.

Fortunately the County has been conservative in estimating current and future revenues in our budget planning. This conservative approach has positioned the County to weather the current financial storm relatively well, especially when compared with many of our sister counties. The County also successfully sought federal economic stimulus funds for numerous programs to help mitigate losses in the current budget cycle. Tulare County received nearly \$10 million for regional road projects, \$3.1 million for dislocated workers and just under \$4 million to

employ youth this summer. The latter program enabled businesses, non-profit and governmental organizations within the County to employ approximately 1,800 youth in need of employment.

The Board of Supervisors wants to express their heartfelt thanks to all County employees for working with the Board to reduce our costs through furloughs and wage reductions and their efforts to continue to provide a high level of service for the residents of Tulare County during these difficult financial times

Tulare County Ag History Museum to Open in October

The Tulare County History of Farm Labor & Agriculture Museum, located at Mooney Grove Park in Visalia, is set to open on Saturday, Oct. 17, 2009.

The 10,000 square-foot twostory museum will house farming equipment, memorabilia, and exhibits that will tell the story of ethnic and immigrant populations that make up Tulare County's rich agricultural history. Displays will tell the story of the Armenians, Portuguese, Japanese, Mexicans, Chinese, Dutch and others who contributed to the history of farm labor in Tulare County.

Collaboration/Educational Uses

The County of Tulare has partnered with the Tulare County Historical Society and the Tulare County Office of Education (TCOE) to create educational programming for the Museum and its Regional Learning Center.

TCOE brings a wealth of experience to the project in

developing programs that address the California State Standards and the requirements outlined in the California Education Code.

Currently the Tulare County
Museum hosts more than
10,000 students each year mostly third-graders who are
studying local history.
Because of the wide-range of
items and topics planned to
be featured in the Tulare
County History of Farm Labor
& Agriculture Museum, there
is a potential to meet the
needs of more than 96,000
students in Tulare County
alone, according to TCOE.

"This promises to be another awesome teaching and learning tool for students in our region," said TCOE Superintendent Jim Vidak.

Program Spotlight: Chip Rock Seal Operation

Tulare County's Resource Management Agency (RMA) will implement its annual Chip Rock Seal Operation through September on 104 miles of roads throughout the county.

Chip rock seal, designed to extend the life of road surface, is applied by spraying a heavy coating of asphalt oil onto a road surface and then covering the oil with rock.
Rollers are then utilized to

embed the rock into the oil forming a new wear surface when complete. After the application of the chip rock seal, the roads will be swept as soon as possible for the safety of motorists.

RMA's Transportation Division advises motorists to find an alternate route or adhere to the posted speed limit on County roads during the scheduled September maintenance. The County urges citizens to drive with caution, adhere to a safe speed, and be alert for work crews in these areas. For more information regarding scheduled road projects, please click HERE.

Board of Supervisors Appoint Jake Raper as RMA Director

The Tulare County Board of Supervisors appointed Jake Raper as Director of the County's Resource Management Agency (RMA) on Aug. 25.

Jake has more than 25 years of municipal and county management experience in the field of planning, public works, redevelopment and economic development. He has been employed since Oct.

2008 as Assistant Director of RMA, directly overseeing the Planning Division. In this role he supervised progress on Tulare County's General Plan update and the evaluation of pending changes to land use policies such as the Williamson Act. Jake began his duties as RMA Director on Aug. 31.

"I'm really looking forward to the challenge of helping Tulare County prepare for its future, and to molding RMA into the responsive organization needed to carry us into that future," Jake said.

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Probation Department hosts G.R.E.A.T. Summer Camp for Youth

One hundred youth from throughout Tulare County attended the Probation Department's Third Annual Gang Resistance Education and Training, or G.R.E.A.T., Summer Camp at the Sequoia National Forest this summer.

The Tulare County Probation
Department partnered with
Community Services & Employment Training, or CSET, to host
this camping experience for
the youth. Attendees were all
G.R.E.A.T. program participants during the preceding
school year.

G.R.E.A.T., funded in part by a grant from the U.S. Department of Justice, is a program offered to 4th through 7th grade students and is designed to encourage abstinence from gang and drug involvement, and to encourage youth to make "great choices" for their future. Tulare

County's participating sites are primarily rural K-8 schools. Two full-time G.R.E.A.T. certified Probation Officers - Gene Fernandez and Lupe Gomez - teach the curriculum-based program to more than 1,800 elementary and middle school students each year.

A critical element of the G.R.E.A.T. Program is the month-long Tulare County Summer Camp. The five-day camp is repeated during a month for up to 25 students at no cost to their parents. Most of the children who attend come from small, poor, rural communities and have never camped or even been to the mountains.

This year the summer camp student lessons included keeping a daily journal; instruction on cultural awareness; conflict resolution; team building; goal setting; leadership; conservation and recycling.

G.R.E.A.T. lessons were reinforced through daily activities that included nature hikes, star gazing and astronomy, forest and fire safety, and the fundamentals of camping such as tent set-up and break-down, packing gear properly, wilderness and wildlife awareness and horseback riding.

At the end of each week, students wrote a letter for their parents as a way to share their camping experience. The students also received a Certificate of Participation and group photos to capture and cherish their experience.
